Country house





Can Milà dates back to the 14th century and is one of the oldest country houses still standing in Sitges today. The property was initially known by the name of Mas dels Ferrers, with the change of name coming when the Milà family acquired it. It underwent a major restructuring process at the start of the 20th century, resulting in is current appearance. The house passed to Josep Robert i Mestre in the middle of the 20th century, a pharmacist, bibliophile and producer of the famous Malvasia Robert wine, who bought it and created one of the biggest libraries in the Penedès - Garraf area inside it, occupying all the rooms in the house.



Architecture







The Can Milà complex consists of two free-standing buildings, the main one dating back to the 14th century. Following a comprehensive overhaul, the ground floor of the main building includes the visitor support office and the information area, with its dynamic and appealing interactive communication design. The first floor houses a multi-purpose room used for presentations and corporate events. The other building, constructed in the noucentista style by Josep Maria Martí in 1930, houses the offices of the Tourism Council of Sitges, where promotional, planning and research work is carried out for Sitges as a tourist destination committed to its local surroundings and residents.

The process to adapt the building for its new use also recovered original architectural elements such as floors, cement tiles and colours in the houses.

Sustainable architecture







The outdoor spaces are designed to help native flora and fauna flourish. The concept for the garden, developed with Biodiversitat Sitges, offers a space to stroll in with the gentle fragrances of the Garraf massif.

Nesting boxes have also been installed in the garden, along with shelters for reptiles, insects and bats, plus feeders for wintering birds. Malvasia de Sitges vines have been planted at Can Milà, in collaboration with the Malvasia de Sitges Interpretation Centre and the Celler Hospital wine growing enterprise, returning the house to its origins as a producer of Malvasia Robert.



Now visitors and locals alike can get a feel for this form of cultivation, so characteristic of the Garraf area and this coastal town in particular.
